Dear Ms. Pepper,

Thank you for your letter of March 24, 2010. As you know from our recent town hall meeting in Blackwell, Nix Patterson & Roach ("NPR") continues to pursue claims on behalf of all Blackwell citizens against Freeport-McMoRan and Blackwell Zinc Company. As I stated during the meeting, the court has currently limited our claims to claims for property damage and we are examining legal theories to have the dismissed medical monitoring claims reinstated.

With respect to my letter of March 18, 2010, nothing contained therein was directed at you, iRock, Inc. or anyone associated with you. The *Coffey* case has garnered national attention. The letter was intended to inform residents of Blackwell that someone might attempt to obtain information from them that could be harmful to the *Coffey* case or an individual personal injury case that they might seek to file. Nothing more.

I am pleased to hear that iRock is trained and licensed to test soil, and that such tests are only preliminary in nature. I would encourage you, and the residents whose soil you test, to share those preliminary test results with NPR. Additionally, if iRock does hire a contractor to conduct health tests, NPR would like the opportunity to examine the expected protocols for these health tests before testing begins.

NPR has never, nor will it ever, engage in any unethical or unprofessional conduct. NPR is seeking to represent the entire community of Blackwell and any settlement of claims on behalf of the community would require public notice and court approval.

NPR will continue to keep you and all of its clients apprised of any new developments in the case. If you have any additional questions or concerns, please do not hesitate to contact me.
